Vernon Ricks, Jr. | Member

Vernon H. Ricks, Jr., a third-generation Washingtonian, served in the U.S. Air Force from 1961 to 1965 as a missile technician and teletype/crypto specialist. He began his career with Xerox as an entry-level technician, rising to manager of field services, and retired after 33 years.

A dedicated mentor, he helped advance many young African Americans at Xerox, leading to his role on the corporation's Affirmative Action Development Task Force and as a Founding Member of the Xerox "Corporate Few." He also served on the Congressional Black Caucus Corporate Braintrust and the Montgomery County Police Community Relations Task Force.

Ricks was the first black elected municipal official in Montgomery County, Maryland, serving as councilman and mayor pro-tem in Takoma Park from 1972 to 1982. He is Chairman of the Trustee Board at Mount Zion United Methodist Church in Georgetown, a Golden Heritage Life Member of the NAACP, and Parliamentarian of the Maryland State NAACP. He resides in Potomac, Maryland with his wife.



Craig Rice | Member

Craig Rice was elected to the Maryland General Assembly in 2006 where he served until 2010. In 2010, Craig left the State to run for the Montgomery County Council and following his election win, chaired the Council's Education and Culture Committee and served on its Health and Human Committee. He was a member of the National Association of Counties Board of Directors from 2018-2022 and chaired its Human Services and Education Policy Steering Committee.

He left the Council in 2022 after 3 consecutive terms and became Vice President of Community Engagement for Ronald McDonald House Charities. In February of this year, he was named the CEO of Manna Food Center, the 3rd largest food bank in the Washington Metropolitan region. In his food security leadership roles, he was the co-creator of the Food and Agriculture Resilience committee for the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments and serves on the No Kid Hungry Leadership Council.



Frederick Hawkins | Member

Frederick Hawkins is a dedicated community leader with over 20 years of experience in community engagement and youth development, creating positive change in predominantly African American communities. A graduate of Tuskegee University (HBCU), he began his career in New York City as a Peacemaker Program Manager at the Harlem Children's Zone and later led advocacy for the Adolescent Behavioral Learning Experience (ABLE) program on Rikers Island, the nation's first social impact bond. He also coordinated youth support services with Friends of Island Academy, serving hundreds of families across the five boroughs.

In Montgomery County, Mr. Hawkins has trained over 50 mentors for youth in foster care, facilitated cultural competency workshops, and directed affordable housing initiatives with FEMA, Johns Hopkins University, and DCHA. His efforts included vaccination drives for over 200 residents, rental assistance programs securing over one million dollars, and monthly food donations to under-resourced communities. He also served with the Office of Neighborhood Safety and Engagement, mentoring youth affected by gun violence.

Mr. Hawkins understands the impact of structural injustice but believes in the power of community, the richness of African American culture, and the promise of diversity in Montgomery County.
